
The temperatures here in Whitehorse, YT have been frigid for the first part of January, which may be a good thing as the students all have exams coming up, so the cold weather may encourage them to stay indoors and study.

Exams

Exam week started on January 24th, 2005 and went until February 3, 2005 for the grade 12 students. All other students should be finished exams by Friday, January 28th, 2005. Giving them Monday January 31st, 2005 off school (they may have more days off than that depending on their exam schedule.) All grade eight students will be finished on January 25th, 2005 so grade eights will have January 26th, 2005 - January 31st, 2005 off school. The first day of classes for all grades is February 01st, 2005. Some grade 12's will still be writing exams, but will not be marked absent from class if that is the case. The reason for this is because grades 12 departmental is administered by the British Columbia Department of Education and we overlap this year. This was an accident and The Yukon Government Department of Education is working to rectify the situation.

I will talk about some of the happenings from the past two months. It's been a busy time and in the middle of it Derrick and I were able to visit my family in Ontario for the holidays. It was really nice to be around family, and now they have plans to visit Old Crow next summer!

The Natural Resources Department took part in a couple of meetings via conference call.

First Nations Environmental Stewardship Committee (FNESC)

There was a one year pilot program for Environmental training for First Nations through Yukon College. It was really successful and the coordinators are planning to expand it into a longer program where students will then be ready to enter Renewable Resource programs.

Aboriginal Northern Communities Action Plan (ANCAP)

This committee has been in the process of defining its role and its relationship with the Pathfinder (who was here for the Climate Change Workshop). Energy Baselines are currently being done in four First Nation's communities, and

will wrap up by March 31. Old Crow will somehow take part in this process in the near future.

Climate Change Workshop

Last week VGFN Natural Resources department, NYRRC and CYFN Circumpolar Relations Department hosted this event. I would like to follow up with a newsletter with articles about each of the presenters and what community members said.

We were able to offer honorariums to all the elders that live in Old Crow. Invitations were delivered by two students (Chantal and Brandie) who were hired for project assistance. The elders honorarium was a very special and rare thing that we were able to offer to acknowledge the life long experience of so many. It does not mean that future events will be able to have the same offer, but that for this time only we were happy to make special invitations to so many. Chantal and Brandi made a wonderful computer presentation about Climate Change, and really showed what a good PowerPoint presentation looks like.

At the school the students were very busy learning about climate change and I would like to give a big congratulations to the students for their well-researched posters. Also, a big thank-you to Elsie Hume's class for attending the workshop for two afternoons. Your presence was awesome, and I think it really made everyone appreciate the work we need to do. Speaking of which, a Climate Change Working Group was formed. If you are interested in being a part of this, the first meeting is scheduled for Monday Feb. 7 at 6pm (VGFN Office). Please look out in case there is a change in scheduling.

Visitor Reception Centre

The plans for the exhibits in the Old Crow Visitor Reception Centre are progressing. On January 25th we met with the detailed designer to review the proposed exhibit plans for the Centre. There are eight exhibits. The text development is taking place concurrently with the exhibit design. Parks Canada's design specialist coordinates all three governments input in to the exhibits. This is the most time consuming part of this project as we deal with the details of getting the information and items necessary for an excellent exhibit area.

Summer Students

Funding for summer students, as with funding for many heritage programs, will

not be confirmed until after the end of the fiscal year. We hope to involve as many young people as possible in the summer heritage work but it will depend on our success in finding funding for this. Student Training and Employment Program funding has been confirmed for one post secondary student in the position of Heritage Assistant.

Cultural Geography Project

The main focus areas for this project right now are the publishable manuscript, educational material production, place name map production, report and proposal writing, and logistical planning for the next year.

Language Activities

Details regarding language activities run by the Heritage Department are covered in the Heritage Researcher's report. Everyone is wel-

come to take part in these free workshops and classes which are always full of laughter. Suggestions are always appreciated for ways we can work to preserve and promote the Gwich'in language.

Researchers

In March archaeologist Ray LeBlanc will be coming to Old Crow to do a presentation to the community on his work at Rat Indian Creek last summer. The crew found five house pits at the site and spent thirty days excavating them. Ray's presentation will cover the work from last summer at Rat Indian Creek and previous archaeological work from this area.

Palaeontologist John Storer has also been invited to come to Old Crow this

spring to do a presentation on the Beringian mammals from this area, including the wooly mammoth.

There are many

other researchers who have applied to work in the VGFN traditional territory during the summer of 2005. These applications are currently under review and will be confirmed by the end of the month.

Reserch

The beginning of this new year started off with researching information related to the Dempster Highway land uses. This information is needed for a brochure type document that is being put together by the Trondek Hwechin, Nacho Nyak Dun, Tetlit Gwich'in and Vuntut Gwitchin First Nations. This informational brochure will highlight information about some key land use areas, place names etc. for VGFN and the other respective first nations. I enjoyed going back into the interviews that were done some years ago about the Dempster Highway, VGFN land usage project by Erin Sherry. There are a lot of interesting stories that were shared by our Elders and by VGFN land users in the younger and middle age category. I always am intrigued by storytelling of our people. Stories are a natural part of who we are. It is through listening to these and other stories that we find out about our rich cultural and traditional heritage, about our land, waters and traditional uses, of survival and sustenance, of traditional knowledge, values and teachings. This is where we learn

about our strong spiritual connection to our whole ecosystem, in living as one with the land and animals.

Filming

On January 14, I left to Whitehorse along with Codirector, Tracy Kassi on our journey to attend the Tromso International Film



Festival being held in Tromso, Norway from January 18-23, 2005. On January 15th, we left from Whitehorse for Vancouver with a six hour stopover before heading off for London Heathro Airport, a nine hour flight overseas. From London we caught the flight to Oslo, Norway, then on the last leg of the trip, finally got to Tromso, Norway, a city of approximately 54,000 people. This was my first ever international trip and it was an eye opener. I had a good guide, Tracy, she filled me in on what to expect, what to do etc. Apparently, I did very well traveling and am very grateful to her for "showing me the way." Our film entitled "Imprints of Our Ancestors, Parts 1 & 2" was screened on January 18 & 19/05. As Film Directors we were given the opportunity to introduce our films and while we had that chance we mentioned our need to protect the calving grounds of Porcupine caribou herd. I was indeed honoured to be at the Tromso International Film Festival! The second screening had more people in attendance. We had good applause afterwards. This was very emotional for Tracy and I. A lady from the Sami nation approached us afterwards and gave us excellent feedback. That was my highlight, wanting to meet someone from the Sami people and to shake their hand. The lady told us "that finally Indigenous people are making films about their own people" She was impressed and congratulated us on our accomplishments with our film. Wow! Thank you to David Moen of Tromso International Film Festival for selecting our film for screening at such at worldwide event. Mahsi Choo to our travel funders for making this once in a lifetime trip possible.

Social Assistance


People that are on Social Assistance were encouraged to attend, however not everyone felt they needed to be part of the group. The numbers of recipients were up, as normal in December and January.



The Housing Symposium was held on Jan 18-19, 2005. This meeting went very well. The two days consisted of community concerns and issues. Some of the primary concerns were costs of rent, rent to own, cost over run, and the homeownership issues!

There was also the issue of homeownership responsibility to O&M and the maintenance of the building.

There was talk on how or if there is any way that we could bring material costs

meeting specifically Resolutions 15 and 16 from last August GA.

Resolution 15 -That the General Assembly directs the VGFN to: 1. Amend the housing policy to provide the opportunity for Old Crow citizens, who occupy units managed by the VGFN, to rent-to-own or purchase the units from the VGFN so that they can own and maintain their own homes; 2. Deal with the rent-to-own and purchase price of the housing units on a case-by-case basis that take into account the various federal and territorial funding programs that have been used to renovate, add on or fix the specific units.

Resolution 16 - Therefore be it resolved: That VGFN government hold a housing summit in the community of Old Crow to deal with recovering cost overruns and the fair and equitable collection of rent and to deal with the overall housing.


I'm happy to be in Old Crow, not only because my husband, Barry Drury, is here, but also to return to life in a small community set in beautiful surroundings.
